# "When the Light Goes On"

We live in darkness. It is a darkness of sin, evil, pride and a blindness to the sin, evil and pride. Because of the pride and blindness, we are each inclined to think that we have a special ability to seeô especially the darkness in others. But the reality is that this darkness courses through our veins and without some intervening help, we are like moles who aimlessly zig and zag their way through life under the turf.

This darkness is the reason that Scripture is our focus this fall with a sermon series based on Psalm 119:105: õ*Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path*.ö This week, we consider Psalm 36, which begins in the same way that I began this articleô with a reflection on the darkness and evil in the world. But then, the author shifts into praise for Godøs love and faithfulness and includes these stunning words (vs. 9): õ*For with you is the fountain of life; in your light we see light*.ö

For the darkness that can overwhelm us through illness and hardship, we need the light to go on so that we can see how he is the fountain of life.

For the darkness that takes away our joy or makes us ugly and destructive in our relationships, we need the light to go on so that we can see the joy, beauty and love of Jesus in his relationship with us.

For the darkness of our hidden life where we drink a few too many or choose sexual impurity, we need the light that points to the much better alternative of a odrink from the river of delights (vs. 8).

For the darkness that would divide us rather than bind us together in unity, we need the light of his Word to learn the magnitude of the price paid for that unity.

So how does that light in which we see light go on for us? Or, how does the Word become a light for our path so that we can see our way through the darkness? Last weeks sermon revealed how Gods Word as text is perfect in its expression of who God is and what he is doing to redeem the world. But we also saw that God also sent his son, Jesus, as the Word made flesh to fully express who God is.

Many of you have expressed your frustration with reading, understanding and applying the Bible so that the light does go on. This is one reason that Branson Parler is teaching a series throughout this fall on how to study and better understand the Word so that the light goes on. Branson teaches many of the same things to his students at Kuyper College. When we read a text, how do we take into account the genre, immediate context and at the same time, the big story. All of these things are vital for also seeing how all of Scripture points to Jesus as Word, Light, Savior and Lord. Last Sunday, the teaching focused on how we can study togetherô sometimes disagreeingô but do so without anxiety and in the context of love for one another.

Every day, we need light for the darkness that pervades our lives. Scripture reveals that the light in which we see light is also a work of his Spirit. Christ, through his Spirit, guides and opens our minds to see the transforming truth of his Word (Luke 24:45) and so we should pray specifically for Godøs Spirit to do this for us.

Scripture also reveals how the community is vital for the light in which we see light. The Eunuch needed Philip to sit with him (Acts 8:26-40). The Pentecost believers õdevoted themselves to the apostlesø teaching and to the fellowship.ö The light goes on when we are faithful to be with each other in community. And so this is one of the most significant reasons that we meet together in small groupsô so that we can õinstruct one another,ö õteach and admonish one anotherö and then, together, practice all of the things we learn such as loving one anotherô so that the light goes on! Jesus said, õwhoever lives by the truth comes into the lightö (John 3:21). Let us increasingly learn to live by the truth and come into the light.

# The History of 4th Church - From Ionia to Union Avenue

ocal industrial expansion and the departure of many church members from the immediate area led the congregation of Fourth Reformed Church to seek a new home after having been at 1031 Ionia Avenue since 1888. A desire to leave had existed for many years. As mentioned earlier, an unsuccessful appeal was made to move the church to the corner of North and Page Street as early as 1926. During World War II, church members were encouraged to buy war bonds made payable to an ever growing building fund.

A committee was finally formed in January 1951 to seek a new church location. Of three proposed sites, the choice became the 5 ½ acre Eli Cross estate at the corner of Union Avenue and Page Street. Other locations considered were the corner of Burke and Leonard Street NE and on Spencer near Portland NE. Special finance and building committees were formed in April 1951. The former greenhouse site, purchased for \$30,500.00, was paid off by January 1953.

Sacrificial congregational giving and fund raising projects brought hopes for a new church closer to reality. At a congregational meeting on September 16, 1953, it was determined that the church was in a sound financial position to have building plans drawn up. The type of architecture was soon after approved. James H. Haveman was chosen to be the architect in March 1954.

Although it had been hoped that construction could begin in the spring of 1954, a year would pass before a \$100,000.00 bank loan could be matched by congregational funds. On April 10, 1955 (Easter Sunday night), the congregation met in the old church for the last time. The property, sold to the Grace Assembly congregation for \$15,000.00, was destroyed by fire on March 19, 1957. Today, the former site is occupied by Autodie, a die manufacturing plant at 44 Coldbrook NW.

For one year, the congregation met for worship at the Ladies Literary Club, 61 Sheldon SE. Other proposed locations included Creston Christian School, Creston High School, the Seventh Day Adventist Church, 100 Sheldon SE and Fountain Street Church. Weekly activities including consistory meetings and choir rehearsals took place at Bethel Reformed Church, 1700 Coit NE.

Two committees played a major role in the realization of the new church. During the period of construction, the finance committee consisted of Lester Scherpenisse (Chairman), William Bommelje, Melvin Stuit, Franklin Ryskamp, Walter Koets, Charles Reitsma and William Wagenaar. The building committee was composed of Neil VerHage (Chairman), James Berrevoets, Seward Stoepker, Harold Zeeff, Abraham Johnson, Marvin VanderVelde and Harry DeJong.

Two events heralded the start of construction. Mr. Frank Koen, the oldest member of the greater consistory, turned over the first shovelful of dirt at the groundbreaking ceremonies on March 30, 1955. On June 15, the cornerstone was laid. Construction of the new church, coordinated by general contractor N.J. Westra and Son, was begun on April 14 and completed in about a year. Its completion was celebrated with a dedication service on April 17, 1956. A community service took place on April 20, followed by an organ recital on April 22.

The completed church, of modified gothic design, consisted of an assembly room, pastorøs study, kitchen, womenøs lounge, a 14 room education unit and sanctuary with a seating capacity of 650. The stained glass windows in the sanctuary illustrate the theme *The Christian Life*. Final landscaping and blacktopping of the parking lot were completed by the fall of 1956. The final cost of the building and furnishings was \$225,000.00 with the total value of the church and property set at just under \$283,000.00.

Later additions would bring the church property to its present state. The storage garage was built in 1960. The present parsonage was first occupied in 1962. The present church structure was completed on March 17, 1966 with the dedication of the education-recreational addition, which includes the library, office, pastorøs study, nursery and fireside lounge.
